Co-sponsored with the Asian American and Asian Resource Cultural Center and Native American Educational Resource Center

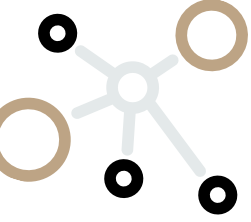

Connecting with your Academic Advisor!

Your advisor is available as a resource to help support your success. The more you can share with your advisor about the goals you have during your time at Purdue, the better! This can help ensure you're connected to appropriate resources and information. As a reminder, you will meet with your advisor at least once per semester to schedule classes. To schedule an appointment with your advisor, use [BoilerConnect](#).

Students should go to KRAN 352 with their Purdue ID for advising appointments. The front desk employees will ask for their student ID, advisor, and the time of their appointment. The front desk employees will check the students in, and their appropriate advisor will be out to greet them for their appointment!

TIPS FOR CONNECTING WITH YOUR ADVISOR:

- Enter appointments with an open mind! You are at Purdue for a reason, and are capable of being successful here. To help you reach your goals, be open to sharing information with your advisor about how courses are going, clubs you are interested in, or any concerns that arise throughout the semester. **Advisors cannot see your grades until they post at the end of the semester, so if you are struggling in a course, it's important to share with them.**
- When communicating with your advisor over email, keep in mind we will always respond, but it may take up to 48 hours (Monday - Friday, from 8 am - 5 pm). Including your questions in one email to your advisor can help them respond to all your concerns best.
- When attending appointments in-person or virtually, be sure to arrive on time. If you are more than 5 minutes late to a 30 minute appointment, you may be asked to reschedule.

CareerBound Competencies of the Month: Communication and Leadership

CareerBound is a program designed to help Krannert students to prepare for life after college! The program is career-readiness focused and centers around developing eight career competencies. This month, the focus is on **Leadership** and **Communication**. To track your progress toward each competency, make sure to download the CareerBound app. Go to your app store and type in Suitable to get started!

Leadership is a concept most are familiar with, but not everyone understands. There are many different approaches to leadership and qualities that make someone a "good" leader. Does leadership require an appointed position, like President or Director, or can we all practice leadership in our lives? A great way to begin practicing leadership is by attending the **Doster Leadership Conference** on September 11th and 12th in Indianapolis.

The Doster Leadership Conference is Krannert's premier leadership opportunity for first and second year students focused on developing future leaders. The student-organized conference connects students to their peers, alumni, and corporate representatives. To practice this month's second competency, **Communication**, take advantage of the new relationships you are building here on campus. Whether you choose to get to know your RA or introduce yourself to professors, how you communicate is just as important as what you communicate. When introducing yourself to your professor, be sure to address them appropriately. It is a good rule of thumb to start with the most formal greeting, like "Dr. Shizara". If your professor shares they are okay with a more informal greeting, then it is appropriate to address them that way.
